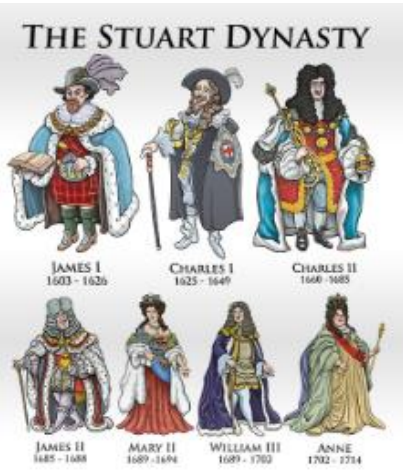


History: Which monarch would have earned the respect of Robin Hood? (A study of a theme in British history that extends pupils' chronological knowledge beyond 1066)

Key Vocabulary:	
source	An artefact that provides information about a specific time period.
reign	Period of time a monarch rules.
monarch	A king or queen.
Magna Carta	An agreement between a monarch as his or her subjects.
catholic	A denomination of Christianity that does not permit divorce.
protestant	A denomination of Christianity that does permit divorce.
Tudor period	A royal dynasty held from Henry VII to Elizabeth I.
dynasty	A period of time where the rulers are of the same line of descent.
Stuart period	A royal dynasty held in Scotland and Britain. (Scotland 1371-1714 and Britain 1603 – 1649, 1660-1714)
parliament	A group of (usually) elected people who make the laws.
Gunpowder plot	November 5 th 1605 A plot to blow up the houses of parliament.
English Civil War	A war between Royalists and Parliamentarians.
exile	A situation where a person is forced to leave a country.
execution	Legal penalty of death.

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Sticky knowledge

- Robin Hood is believed to have existed in the 13th / 14th century.
- It is thought that Robin Hood was an outlaw who hid in Sherwood Forest Nottinghamshire however there are many records who could be this man linked to Nottinghamshire and Yorkshire.
- The principles of the Magna Carta that was signed in 1215 by King John still exist today.
- The most famous Tudor monarch was King Henry VIII who was married six times. The outcomes for each of his wives can be remembered through the rhyme divorced, beheaded, died, divorced, beheaded, survived.
- Although James I was ruler of England and Scotland, they did not follow the same laws or rights.
- The Stuarts (James I, Charles I and Charles II) also had links to Sherwood Forest
