#### National Curriculum subject content:

##### Word Reading:

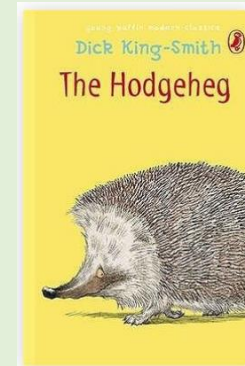
Pupils should be taught to:

- ✓ apply their growing knowledge of root words, prefixes and suffixes (etymology and morphology) to understand the meaning of new words they meet
- ✓ read further exception words, noting the unusual correspondences between spelling and sound, and where these occur in the word.

##### Comprehension:

Pupils should be taught to:

- ✓ develop positive attitudes to reading and understanding of what they read by:
- ✓ listening to and discussing a wide range of fiction, poetry, plays, non-fiction and reference books or textbooks
- ✓ reading books that are structured in different ways and reading for a range of purposes
- ✓ using dictionaries to check the meaning of words that they have read
- ✓ increasing their familiarity with a wide range of books, including fairy stories, myths and legends, and retelling some of these orally
- ✓ identifying themes and conventions in a wide range of books English 37 Statutory requirements
- ✓ preparing poems and play scripts to read aloud and to perform, showing understanding through intonation, tone, volume and action
- ✓ discussing words and phrases that capture the reader's interest and imagination
- ✓ recognising some different forms of poetry [for example, free verse, narrative poetry]
- ✓ understand what they read, in books they can read independently, by:
- ✓ checking that the text makes sense to them, discussing their understanding and explaining the meaning of words in context
- ✓ asking questions to improve their understanding of a text
- ✓ drawing inferences such as inferring characters' feelings, thoughts and motives from their actions, and justifying inferences with evidence
- ✓ predicting what might happen from details stated and implied
- ✓ identifying main ideas drawn from more than one paragraph and summarising these
- ✓ identifying how language, structure, and presentation contribute to meaning
- ✓ retrieve and record information from non-fiction
- ✓ participate in discussion about both books that are read to them and those they can read for themselves, taking turns and listening to what others say.
