



Pupil Premium Spending 2016-17

This year Intake Farm Primary School has received £106,000 for Pupil Premium funding. The funding has been spent on the following to ensure that we are doing all we can to diminish the difference between Pupil Premium children and non-Pupil Premium children.

Year 6 Booster Classes	£3,000	<p>1 teacher and 2 TAs provide support for Y6 children leading up to SATS. Targeted support for Reading, Maths and GaPS.</p>	<p>All PP children have access to these.</p>

IT equipment to support learning	£3,000	Wi-Fi developed to improve accessibility	PP children have access Wi-Fi in all classes to support learning at discretion of teaching staff.
Monitoring activities	£5,000	Many weekly monitoring activities have a specific focus on PP children to evaluate teaching and learning in core subjects. Pupil achievement meetings include dialogue about the progress and attainment of PP children with class teachers.	PP children monitored on a regular basis to ensure that the gap is closed.
